Chinese Arts and Authors

A new feature of our newsletter will be to introduce readers of Tea Leaves to works of Chinese artists and authors or to works about China or Chinese people.



Anchee Min has written seven books, all based on her life and memories of China. Her first was Red Azalea, an autobiography of growing up in China during communist rule and China's Cultural Revolution. A best seller published in 1994, it has been translated into 32 languages. This past summer, I had the pleasure of reading three of her works: Empress Orchid, The Last Empress and Pearl of China. Empress Orchid and the Last Empress tell the story of a poor Machurian girl who is chosen as one of the seven wives of Emperor Hsien Feng. These books are a fictionalized account of Empress Dowager Cixi, who ruled China during the last 46 years of the Ch'ing Dynasty, through the Emperor and her son. The books' setting is the Forbidden City and Anchee Min provides fascinating details of the structural and design significance of the Forbidden City as well as court life.

Anchee Min's latest book is Pearl of China. In this book, Min honors Pearl S. Buck (The Good Earth) through the telling of a story of the life-long friendship between Willow, a Chinese girl, and Pearl. The story conveys how the friendship survives and endures even amidst China's cultural and political transitions. Anchee Min's books are filled with historical information written within the context of her stories. Min also authored Katherine, Become Madame Mao and Wild Ginger, which I am excited to read.



Last Train Home

Save *Last Train Home* on your Netflix Queue. It is unlikely that this remarkable documentary, directed by Lixin Fan, will show at any of our local theaters. The story follows the Zhang family, whose parents left their children behind sixteen years ago to seek work in the large booming economic cities of China in hopes of creating a better life for their children. The dilemma this creates as well as the cultural and economic transitions occurring in China is depicted in a manner that causes the viewers to reflect upon their own lives. *Last Train Home* has received numerous awards, including Best Cinematography (Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival) and winner of the San Francisco International Film Festival Golden Gate Award for Investigative Documentary.

A day when paper money and offerings are made to dead ancestors.

Mid-Autumn Moon Festival

Held on the 15th day of the eighth month of the lunar calendar to celebrate the end of the summer harvest.

October 5

Double Ninth

To avoid too much "yang", it is customary to climb a high mountain, drink chrysanthemum wine and wear the zhuyu (Cornus officinalis) plant to maintain balance.

November 10

Water Lantern Festival

Flower shaped lanterns or other offerings are placed on a stream or river to meet visiting spirits/ghosts.

December 1

Winter Solstice Festival

(Chinese Thanksgiving)
